Music 8: Music of Multicultural America Course Syllabus

Description

This course is a comparative and integrative study of the multicultural music styles of the United States. It includes examples of the musics of Native Americans, European Americans, African Americans, Chicano/Latino Americans, and Asian Americans, tracing the development of that music from its historical roots to its influence on contemporary American music. Special attention is given to each group's unique history and experience in American culture and society; analysis of each group's musical traditions from a technical and a cultural perspective; and sequential development of listening and descriptive skills through a variety of media including films and recordings.
