

Questions/Criteria for analyzing approaches to teaching and learning

How do you know if a program or approach is worthwhile?

1. Can the approach demonstrate appropriate outcomes?
 - Are outcomes evident in student work?
 - on traditional measures (e.g. test scores, attendance etc.)?
 - for some or all populations?
 - Is the approach supported by research?
 - Who carried out the research (are they wholly or partially independent)?
 - Do these research draw on multiple source of data?
 - Are results consistent over time and across different contexts?
 - Do they look at the effectiveness of different parts of the approach?
 - What are they really evaluating?
2. Does the Theory of Action Change make sense?
 - Is it explicit?
 - internally consistent?
 - plausible?
 - How is it justified/supported? (research on learning/motivation, Theories of culture, organizational development, economics, etc.)
3. What values does it reflect?
 - What's the purpose?
4. Is it practical? Can it be implemented successfully?
 - What resources does it require to make it work?
 - Can it be sustained?
5. Can it be trusted?
 - Who's behind it?
 - What's their background?
 - What's their "track record"?

Ultimately, how does it compare with others?
