edit grammar

- work on the opening paragraph so the topic of your paper is clearer: what specifically about mummies are you going to focus on? make transition of ideas from one paragraph to another smoother

* do more research. Use more than one source for both pieces, cite

* Make your voice come through in your writing. We don't want just facts, we want your interest in the topic to be evident in the paper.

* in the Walter White piece: perhaps choose one of the ideas that you wrote about in your paper and focus on that, go more in depth. Bring more focus to the paper - what is it about White that is interesting to you?

* edit for grammar
